## Foods from around the World



**F**ounded in 2005, Foods from around the World brings you food from every corner of the globe. Their CEO, Johnathon Medway, had the idea for the company after he spent a year traveling around the world, eating exotic foods in each country that he visited.

Johnathon says, "We buy directly from our producers and all the food you buy from us has the Fairtrade guarantee. That means the food is from small-scale farmers in countries like India, Chile, and Egypt. Workers are treated fairly and paid a living wage. So Costa Rican coffee growers and Kenyan tea growers all earn enough to live on if you buy our products."

So, how does the company find new products to sell? They have a team of "tasters" who travel around a different region of the world, trying food in markets, cafés, and from shops and factories. The "tasters" then make a shortlist of their favorite products for the "selectors" to choose from at the head office. Finally, the "selectors" talk to the producer and agree a trade deal. What to do when you hear the fire alarm

A fire in the workplace is what 63% of employees fear the most. But there are some simple steps that you can follow to make sure you stay safe. First of all, don't panic: remember the instructions from your fire drill. If you smell smoke, activate the fire alarm. You should only use a fire extinguisher on a small fire. You should stay calm and leave the building using the stairs. Don't use the elevator, even if you are not fit. You should also leave all your belongings at your desk—don't waste time.
